Author Guidelines

Page Layout

Left margin is to be 4 cm and other margins are to be 2.5 cm. Footnotes if any are to remain within these limits. In all first pages (contents, abbreviations, list of tables, graphs and symbols, preface, abstracts, parts, bibliography, appendix etc.), there is to be 5 cm upper page margin for the heading. Lines are to be justified.

Texts are written with 1.5 spaces. Abbreviations, list of tables, graphs and symbols, preface, abstracts, bibliography, appendix, names and explanations of tables, graphs, photos etc. in the article/essay are written with 1 space. Subtitles are not to be the last sentences of a page. If it is not possible to write at least 2 more lines, the title is to be on the next page. Similarly, first sentence of a paragraph cannot be the last sentence of a page and last sentence of a paragraph is not to be the first sentence of a page.

Before and after paragraphs spacing is to be 6 pt.

Heading spacing is to be as follows:

First headings: Before 71 pt., after 18 pt.

Second headings: Before 18 pt., after 12 pt.

Third and Fourth headings: Before 12 pt., after 6 pt.

After fourth headings, no more sub-headings are allowed.

Fonts and Size

Times New Roman characters are to be used on the condition that those other alphabets save for Turkish can also be used for quotations or writing borrowed concepts from another language. Font size is to be 12 for main text, 10 for footnotes and 14 for titles and subtitles.

Abstract

Abstract is the section explaining the most concise summary of an article's scope. In an abstract, issues, methods, technics and results of the article are emphasized together with the title of the article and name of the author at the beginning of the page. English and Turkish abstracts each of which is not over 250 words are to be prepared.

Citations (References)

Citations made from other sources are either exactly quoted or summarized/commented by the author without changing the essence of them. In both cases citations are absolutely to be made to the source(s) including texts, tables, graphs etc. Principles below are followed on this subject:

- **a.** Exact quotations from sources are shown by double quotation marks ("....."). In citations where the essence of information in the source remains unchanged but the style is changed, double quotation marks are not used. In both cases, citations are certainly to be made to the related source(s) and footnote system is used.
- **b.** In the article, either all the information from the source or only some parts of it as sentences, paragraphs or pages can be given. In the latter case, omitted sections are emphasized with three dots (...) to demonstrate the fact that some sentences, paragraphs or pages are skipped.
- **c.** In cases of exact quotations from sources, all mistakes including punctuation and translation errors and those in letters, sentences, dates and places etc. are repeated too. If the author wishes to correct such mistakes, true information are shown just after the incorrect information in brackets.
- **d.** If exact quotations from sources are not over one sentence, they are given within the main text of the article. For longer quotations, minimum 2 spaces are to be left between the first and last sentence of the quotation and the main text of the article in order to distinguish the quotation from the text. For such quotations, font size is to be smaller than that of the main text of article.

Rules for Reference Footnotes

In footnotes, if a reference is made to the related source for the first time, all bibliographical information about the source is given in the following order:

Author's name and surname; title of the source; editor(s); translator's name and surname; volume, printing and publication information (number of volumes, editions, series name, publication place, publisher, publication date), volume number and page number(s).

Following second reference to the same source:

A.e. (Turkish articles) or Ibid.

Following second reference to the same source with different page number:

A.e., s.40. (Turkish articles) or Ibid, p.40.

Reference again to Bülent Tanör's book when other references are interceded:

Tanör, Osmanlı-Türk Anayasal Gelişmeleri, s.22. (Turkish articles) or

Tanör, a.g.e., s.22. (Turkish articles) or

Tanör, ibid, p.22.

Appendix:

In the appendix section of an article, there are tables, forms, lists of survey questions, copies of hard-to-find documents, photos, maps, etc. For such one material there is just one appendix, for more than one material, if necessary, there are to be more than one appendix. If there are appendices necessary to differentiate from one another, they are numbered with big Roman or Arabic numerals in a consecutive order. A title emphasizing the content of the appendix is suggested to be placed next to the appendix number. If information in the appendix is cited from other sources, references are definitely to be indicated.
